GSP MATTERS FOR UTAH

The Generalized System of Preferences (GSP) program allows U.S. companies to import certain products duty free from developing countries. In 2012, GSP eliminated tariffs on nearly \$20 billion worth of imports and saved American companies \$750 million, including those in Utah.


Yet GSP expires on July 31, 2013 and Congress must pass legislation to renew GSP for Utah companies to continue receiving these benefits.


