GSP MATTERS FOR WEST VIRGINIA

The Generalized System of Preferences (GSP) program allows U.S. companies to import certain products duty free from developing countries. In 2012, GSP eliminated tariffs on nearly \$20 billion worth of imports and saved American companies \$750 million, including those in West Virginia.


Yet GSP expires on July 31, 2013 and Congress must pass legislation to renew GSP for West Virginia companies to continue receiving these benefits.


