What Does It Mean? *The top 10 countries using GSP are a regionally mixed group that represents Asia, Africa, Latin America, and even Europe. It is interesting to note that each of these top exporters – with the exception of Equatorial Guinea – had a per capita income in 2006 that was less than half of the automatic country “graduation” income of approximately \$11,100.*

Product Coverage Is Limited. *The third column of the table shows that the bulk of what the United States imports from most of the major beneficiaries of the GSP program actually do not receive GSP benefits. For example, only 20 percent of total U.S. imports from India receive GSP benefits. This is because most of the products that these countries export to the United States do not qualify for GSP benefits.*
